Secretary's Report

Notification has been received from GSO that Area 65 will be implementing the "Fellowship New Vision" data base updating system in the next month or two. When this occurs the first area action will be to reconcile any differences for information recorded in the GSO data base and the Area Directory. The area does not automatically receive notification of any update information previously sent to GSO since the beginning of January this year. DCMs will be sent customized spreadsheets for group and GSR Area Directory information for their individual Districts. It would be most helpful if these spreadsheets could be used to send in updates for the Area Directory.

As soon as access to the GSO data base is obtained, data will be extracted from it to again produce customized District spreadsheets to use for side-by-side comparison of the Area Directory and GSO data for final reconciliation. Once this is accomplished, the future data updating procedure should be infinitely simpler and dual updating will be eliminated. Until then, DCMs are requested to please be patient with the transition as there likely will be instances where some past updates may not be reflected in the data. Again, however, the future procedures will be simplified to having only one contact point (the "Area Recorder") for maintaining the data in both the area and GSO data bases.

Treasurer's Report

Dear NETA 65, District 42 recently hosted a workshop on "Spirituality and Money" at the Suburban Group in Tyler. Stuart R (Area 65 CF Chair) and I had the honor to present at this workshop. We had great discussion on this topic as well as fun and fellowship.

One topic of discussion was the February 2007 letter from Vincent Keefe, Treasurer of the General Service Board and the idea that as a fellowship, we could completely fund the cost of our GSO with an annual contribution of \$5.75 per AA member. Stuart suggested that he was going to go to his home group and ask for a \$5.75 contribution from each home group

member to send to GSO (in addition to the regular GSO contribution) and the "\$5.75 Plan" was born.

Let's take this same concept and apply it to NETA 65. If each AA member in NETA 65 would make an annual contribution of approximately \$1.89 per year, we would exceed our annual budget and could truly become self-supporting of all of our NETA 65 services.

"Money has never been a requirement for AA membership, and to keep it that way all of AA's trusted servants have an ongoing obligation to inform groups and individuals about the value of self-support and the need for voluntary contributions throughout the Fellowship." (*Self-Support: Where Money and Spirituality Mix.*)

Spanish Videos are being ordered and will be available soon. In keeping with AA Tradition (anonymity), the identity of AA members is protected in all the audiovisuals except the two with Bill W. The Titles below are the English language Videos available for showing.

AA an Inside View - 28 minutes - Depicts alcoholics recovering in AA, going about their daily lives, and attending AA meetings and other gatherings.

Young People and AA - 28 minutes - Four young AA members describe what it was like drinking, what happened to bring them to AA and what their lives are like sober today.

It Sure Beats Sitting in a Cell - 17 minutes - Filmed inside correctional facilities in the US and Canada. This video is about four young AAs who were in prison as a result of drinking, yet today are sober in AA

A.A -- Rap With Us - 16 minutes - Features 4 anonymous young AA members. Rap music and lyrics bridge these four young people's stories of alcoholic despair and AA recovery.

Hope: Alcoholics Anonymous - 15 minutes - Explains the principles of AA: what AA is and isn't, primary purpose, sponsorship, home group, the Steps and Traditions, and basic recovery tools.

Bill Discusses the Twelve Traditions - 65 minutes - Bill W. tells how the principles safeguarding AA unity developed.

Bill's Own Story - 60 minutes - Co-founder Bill W. tells of his drinking and recovery.

Your AA General Service Office, the Grapevine, and the General Service Structure - 22 minutes - Tour the Grapevine office and your GSO, which also contains information on AA's service structure.

Carrying the Message Behind These Walls - 15 minutes - Focuses on encouraging more AAs to participate in carrying

the message into correctional facilities and addresses some of the concerns that hold members back from this rewarding service.

Markings on the Journey - 35 minutes - Depicts AA's history using rare material from AA's archives.

GSR Richardson Group, District 54

Greetings to NETA. I wanted to share my thoughts and my experience about the NETA. I came in as a GSR halfway through panel 56 and will serve another full term as the Richardson group GSR. According to the 2006 Final Conferences Report, we have about 500 groups registered in our area. My experience of attending the Area assemblies is that we have an attendance of about 120 or less at each assembly. Why are the GSRs not attending? Why are groups choosing not to be a part of the fellowship as a whole? Are we not making our assembly attractive? I have been thinking about this for some time and Tradition 2 comes to mind.

There are two parts to Tradition 2. The first part talks about a loving God expressing himself in our group conscience. If that is the case, the group conscience should have a wide cross-section of members, sharing their experience, strength, and hope at the assemblies. At the General Service Conference, there are 93 delegates between the US and Canada that make up 2/3 of the voting members. If you were comparing our area to the GSC, where is the 2/3 represented by GSRs? Having a 2/3 majority of GSRs would help us to have an informed group conscience within the area.

The groups are the ultimate authority and if your group does not agree with how this area carries the message of Alcoholics Anonymous, then please suit up, and show up. Be the voice of AA. The only way something changes is to take action, and my first action as a GSR was to attend the assemblies and be one of those voices. If we had all 500 group's voices attending our assemblies and sharing what they think is important when it comes to our Fifth Tradition, then I know a lot more could be accomplished.

I have heard that some groups feel that all we do at these assemblies is talk "politics." That being said, the best way to change that perception is for your group to send a GSR to the assemblies to share that with us. One member at our last assembly stood up and said, "Where is God in all this?" I think

that person was right. Sometimes I think we forget that God is the ultimate authority.

The second part of Tradition Two talks about us being trusted servants and that we don't govern anyone in AA. If we don't have enough GSRs there, then we do not have the AA group's voices being heard. Having a diverse cross-section of experience ensures that no one person or group of people can power drive our assembly.

As a GSR, I represent my home group in voting matters, and I vote how my group informs me, unless I feel it will affect AA as a whole. If that be the case, I would exercise my Right of Decision under Concept 3 and vote differently.

This is an example of one way that members of an area might try to "influence" the groups might be this. Hypothetically, say the members attending the assemblies were all service sponsored by the same 3 or 4 people and were guided on how to vote. Are they really being trusted servants? In this case, the area would be under the "influence" of those 3 or 4 members.

If the assembly was filled up with 2/3 majority or more GSRs from different groups and districts, we would have a bigger cross section, and thus a better chance for an informed group conscience.

I like to feel that I am "a part of AA" at my assemblies; and when I get to participate in area inventories and committees, my group's voice is being heard.

By exercising our Right of Participation under Concept Four, we can make the changes to our area that will make it more attractive and fun.

As a GSR, when I am not allowed to participate I feel like AA is becoming exclusive and I begin to feel like a second class citizen.

Dr Bob and Bill W. had very different personalities. Dr Bob was quiet and humble and Bill was the promoter and leaned more towards the "power driver." Together, their personalities balanced each other out and gave us our start. Some days I have Dr. Bob's mentality; others days I have Bill's.

If we don't have good participation from the groups, we could end up with a majority of Bill W. personalities and have to deal with a bunch of power drivers. If we had a majority of Dr. Bob's, than we probably would never get anything done. However, I believe that those two personalities together will give our area the balance it needs when we, as individuals, live the three legacies.

We need the groups that have chosen NOT to participate, to come back, so that we can have an informed group conscience.
